

COVID-19 Resources for International Travelers

The American Rescue Plan provides funding to the Department of State to avoid staffing reductions and ensure continuity of operations overseas, including support for increased medical services capacity at U.S. embassies and consulates.

Should I travel abroad during the pandemic?

Travel is not advised. The outbreak and spread of the novel coronavirus have disrupted travel across the globe. Virginians, as well as all Americans, should heed the advice of public health officials by avoiding all nonessential travel. My office has worked to provide assistance to many Virginians traveling abroad who, because of travel restrictions related to the spread of the coronavirus, were otherwise unable to return home. The State Department warns that at this time, American travelers abroad could find their travel "severely disrupted," and could face difficulty returning to the U.S. Please use the below resources and guidance to inform any travel decisions.

What if I am traveling abroad and am having difficulty returning home?

The State Department has information on requirements for U.S. citizens returning from international travel, including students returning from studying abroad and travelers returning to the United States by cruise ship. Those who are currently traveling abroad should register with the U.S. Department of State at: https://step.state.gov/. Registering with the State Department alerts the nearest embassy to your presence in the country and also allows them to provide important information to you.

How will I know when restrictions are lifted?

Different states and local governments are implementing various guidelines to slow the spread of the virus. Stay informed about international, federal, state, and local restrictions on travel by using the links below.

Federal Resources

- <u>CDC Guidance for Travelers</u> Includes guidance on international and domestic travel, including advisories for those traveling within the United States.
- <u>State Department Travel Advisories</u> Any American travelling abroad should check the State Department's travel advisory page for detailed information on their intended destination. Remember that conditions can change rapidly, so check the travel advisories frequently.
- <u>Department of Transportation Coronavirus Resources</u> Includes guidance from the Department as well as up to date information from the Federal Aviation Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Railroad Administration, and other transportation authorities.
- <u>Federal Aviation Administration Air Travel Guidance</u> Provides guidance from the FAA on air travel, including links to coronavirus information from major airlines
- Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority For information on Metro and COVID-19. WMATA service, including rail and bus service, has been sharply reduced in response to the crisis – WMATA encourages customers to travel for essential purposes only.
