Congressionally Designated Spending Dollars in the FY2024 Government Funding Bill

- The Senators successfully secured \$2,500,000 to improve the intersection of Minnieville Road and Prince William Parkway in Prince William County to relieve congestion, improve safety, enhance access and connectivity to I-95, Potomac Mills, and Dale City, and support economic development plans for the area.
- The Senators successfully secured \$2,031,000 for the Culpepper Garden Senior Affordable Housing Revitalization Project to renovate affordable senior housing to improve accessibility and safety in Arlington County.
- The Senators successfully secured \$1,360,000 to improve and update the Lake Mooney Water Treatment Plant in Stafford County. Specifically, funding will be used for the purchase and installation of water treatment membranes, which are barriers that filter unwanted substances, to provide clean water for Stafford County residents.
- The Senators successfully secured \$1,280,000 to create 321 units of new affordable housing in Arlington County, in a high opportunity zone that is close to job opportunities and public transportation, making it an ideal area for economic mobility.
- The Senators successfully secured \$1,000,000 for the George Mason University Center to develop and establish a program to assist small businesses in capitalizing on Artificial Intelligence (AI) innovations and help train employees to harness AI in Fairfax County.
- The Senators successfully secured \$921,000 to support George Mason University's Center for Health Workforce to serve as the Centralized Technical Assistance hub for regional health workforce development throughout Fairfax County and Virginia. This will help train more health care workers and address workforce shortages by providing resources, like technical and planning assistance, to regions throughout Virginia.
- The Senators successfully secured \$850,000 to build a roundabout connecting Stefaniga Road and Lightfoot Drive with Mountain View Road, a main thoroughfare which provides access to I-95 and Mountain View High School in **Stafford County**. The project will improve walkability and make it easier to travel to the area.
- The Senators successfully secured \$763,000 for Specially Adapted Resource Clubs (SPARC) to
 expand services to increase the ability of adults with developmental disabilities to thrive in their
 communities. SPARC will use the money to build two locations in Alexandria and one location in
 Leesburg.

- The Senators successfully secured \$500,000 for the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments to initiate a feasibility study that will examine options for a secondary drinking water source for the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area. An additional drinking water source would ensure that residents have reliable access to drinking water if a natural or man-made incident significantly affects water quality in the Potomac River.
- The Senators successfully secured \$359,000 for Loudoun County Community Health Center to purchase radiology equipment and to renovate an imaging room at their HealthWorks facility located in Leesburg.
- The Senators successfully secured \$326,000 for United Community Ministries to provide enhanced workforce readiness skills for English learners through job training, digital literacy, and English as a Second Language and English Conversation classes in Mount Vernon.
